With new development applications we look for amenities like bike charging infrastructure and secure bike storage, enhanced pedestrian and bicycle routes and multi-use pathways.

**QUESTION 3** Do you think the budget for cycling infrastructure should increase, stay the same, or decrease and why?



Malcolm Brodie	Increase	
Chak Au	Increase	From 2014-2018, Richmond only added 10.1 KM of bike routes (excluding dyke trails). That is too little and the pace is too slow. We should also establish neighbourhood bike routes on low volume, low speed local streets.
Andy Chiang COUNCIL	Stay the same	We need to prioritize upgrades and understand how these changes can affect motor vehicle traffic. Despite the large and growing number of bikers in our community, motor vehicles are still more common place and we need to ensure proper flow of vehicle traffic. Proper traffic flow with improved bike lanes and pedestrian walkways/sidewalks will lead to safer transportation for all.
Derek Dang	Stay the same	As I said before, there is annual additions and improvement to our Cycling network. We also have to keep our City well managed financially and keep the tax draw on our residents as low as possible.
Carol Day	Increase	If we work each year to make improvements, over time we will have a world class cycling network.
Kelly Greene	Stay the same	Our budget for active modes of transportation could be better deployed, and consultation with people who actually use these methods of transportation would improve our outcomes.
Jonathan Ho	Increase	As the City of Richmond is sitting on huge reserve, I believe it's a worthwhile investment for cycling infrastructure.

Linda McPhail	Stay the same	The City of Richmond recognizes the need to encourage bicycle travel for both transportation and recreation and works to promote bicycle use as a viable, attractive, non-polluting form of transportation and assure safe and convenient access to all areas of the city.  Encouraging cycling as a healthy and convenient transportation choice is an integral part of the City's community and transportation planning. The City's goal is to grow cycling as a travel choice for 10 per cent of all trips in Richmond by 2041.
John Roston	Increase	We have to make cycling both more convenient and safer if we expect to fully derive the health and environmental benefits of cycling. Since Richmond is flat, it is ideal for cycling.

Judie Schneider	Increase	I have been a commuter cyclist for 24 years in Vancouver, Chilliwack, Victoria and Richmond. I experience firsthand the need for continuation of rputes, separation of bikes from traffic/bus lanes and sidewalks. For the last 7 years, I have travelled with my son on the back of my bike and it has been terrifying at times. I gave up owning my own car for the environment years ago and because I love to cycle, walk and support our public transit system - if we don't use it, we will lose it. Transit and cycling work well in conjunction with each other, but only if the systems are in place and are meeting demand. I love to take my bike on the Canada Line, but it is often full in the bike spaces. Upgrades need to be done on bike routes and on public transit in order to keep up with and support the increased needs of cyclists.



Carol Day	Yes	River road is a popular area and it is not wide enough. Increasing the width is a long term goal but in the meantime cyclists must ride single file to be safe. The roadway is also a dyke so improvements are costly and complicated. If we share the road and obey the rules everyone can enjoy River Road and be safe.
Kelly Greene	Yes	There have been too many tragedies on this stretch of road, and due to the physical constraints of the road, both bicycles and cars often don't follow the rules of the road. A brand new plan, starting from scratch, is needed.

Alexa Loo	Yes	We have increased RCMP enforcement along this stretch, improved lighting, signage, and traffic calming to make this stretch safer for everyone.

Linda McPhail	Yes	We have done a lot of consultation with the neighbourhood, traffic safety experts and the RCMP to try and address the safety concerns of all the road users. In April of this year, a suite of road safety measures were endorsed for immediate implementation. This fall there will be a report on the findings of the Richmond RCMP summer enforcement and there may be more safety measures recommended.

Judie Schneider	Yes	People have been killed cycling on that road. I don't care how many drivers complain that it is a pain to share the road with cyclists along there, but that is nothing compared to the pain caused when there is an accident involving a cyclist and vehicle.
Niti Sharma	Yes	Absolutely, yes. We should do everything to prevent accidents and deaths like we have had in Richmond.
